Sunbury, one of the early settlements of Georgia, was located on a bluff on the south side of the Medway river, not far from the present village of Octagon. The site was first observed by Oglethorpe, while on one of his exploring expeditions in January, 1734, but the place was not settled until 1758.

## **Early Settlers of Colonial Virginia - Genealogy**

The site of the present city of Albany was first occupied as a trading post in 1614. After the character of the Privileged West India Company, in 1621, Fort Orange was built, around which clustered the little hamlet occupied by the servants and factors of the Company, who claimed and exercised the entire Indian trade.

The Early Settlers of Boonesborough. On the 1st of April, 1775, Daniel Boone, Richard Henderson and their companions, reached the southern bank of the Kentucky River, and began to build a fort, afterwards known as Boonesborough.

Due to the prominence of Lt. Governor Alexander Spotswood in American history, much was known of his involvement with the establishment of the Germanna Settlement, but little of the German Settlers who were brought to this area with the First Colony of 1714, the Second Colony of 1717, and later groups.

## **Early Settlers of Craven County - New Bern Library**

In 1732, the British philanthropists James Oglethorpe and John Percival secured a royal charter to establish a colony in the area, providing for a board of trustees to govern it. The early settlers included many English debtors, but also Scots, Germans, Swiss, and some German Jews. Oglethorpe arrived with the first group and founded Savannah in 1733.

## **Capt. Samuel Woods, b. 1740 & - Genealogy.com**

The first overland road begins as early as 1725 from Philadelphia to what becomes Lancaster and then on to Harrisburg. An improved road, the Great Conestoga Road, is commissioned to run between Philadelphia and Lancaster and is constructed between 1733 and 1741.
